Question	Answer
Question What phonics programme do you follow?	Answer We follow 'Fryern Phonics' our own phonics programme that was developed alongside Springhill English Hub. It is systematic, synthetic approach to phonics that we show fidelity to across the federation. Our rigorous phonics programme sits within a broad and language rich curriculum. Children start phonics sessions within the first few weeks of school and have daily discrete phonics lessons. We adopt a 'keep-up' approach so additional sessions or interventions are put in place to ensure children don't fall behind. Children have a phonics folder which goes between home and school everyday ensuring parents are aware of the sounds the children are learning. In their phonics folders are phonic word booklets and a
What clubs do you offer?	decodable reading book matched closely to the child's phonic knowledge. In the past we have aimed to offer a wide range of clubs that reflect children's interests as well as offering new experiences. These have included karate, musical theatre, dance, football and digital leaders.
When is the next Ofsted due?	Our last Ofsted was in September 2018 and was 'good' so we would expect one soon.
What if we are out of catchment – should we still apply?	We would strongly recommend that you apply even if you are outside of our catchment. Please view our admissions policy on our website.
If we were offered a place at Fryern Infants, would we be guaranteed a place at Fryern Junior School?	As we are a Federation, children who attend the infants are given priority when applying the Junior school. The junior school is currently undergoing an exciting rebuild – please look at the website for more information.
How do you provide challenge for more able children?	Class teachers use a range of assessment for learning strategies to ensure they know individual children's strengths and areas for development. This enables them to plan learning that offers an appropriate level of scaffolding or challenge for all pupils. Class teachers and LSAs target specific children within the classroom to move their learning forwards in different ways and at different rates. We closely monitor the progress of all children in order to ensure every child realises their potential.
How do you support children with special educational needs?	High quality teaching, adapted for individual pupils, is the first step in responding to pupils who have, or may have SEND. We undertake an assess-plan-do-review cycle when deciding whether to place or keep children on the SEND register. For higher levels of need, we draw on more specialised assessments from outside agencies and professionals. Pupils needing SEN support may have an Individualised Plan (IP), which is written by the class teacher and shared with parents. We are extremely fortunate to have a highly skilled team of LSAs, including ELSAs, who are able to support the children with developing specific skills.
What school trips do you normally go on?	Our school trips are linked to our topics and have included Sea City Museum, Hilliers, Royal Victoria Country Park and Longdown Activity Farm. We also invite in various outside visitors to support with topics and

How do you deal with	We believe that learning can only take place in an environment that
challenging behaviour?	provides security, praise, tolerance and care. Children and adults need to
	be valued and encouraged within an atmosphere of mutual trust and
	respect, where there is an overriding enjoyment of learning.
	We have a positive behaviour ethos at our school and therefore seek to
	reward good behaviour at all times as this develops an ethos of respect,
	kindness and cooperation. We have '4B's', be kind, be honest, be proud
	and be safe which we use to reinforce our high expectations. We
	recognise that children can make the wrong choices and support them to
	reflect upon these and recognise alternative decisions they could have
	made.
	Relationships and communication with parents is vital and any incidents
	are communicated to all families involved. We have an open door policy
	where parents and carers are encouraged to visit to discuss any concerns
	or difficulties.
How does your afterschool	Our wraparound care comprises of a breakfast club and afterschool club,
club work?	both of which are managed by school staff who already have excellent
	relationships with the children. The staff prepare a range of activities for
	the children, including outdoor games, arts and crafts and Lego. Breakfast
	club starts at 7:45am and after school club runs until 6:00pm. Spaces for
	these need to be booked and paid for in advance through the school

What do they do for PE?	Each class has two PE slots a week and their curriculum covers a wide
	range of PE opportunities including dance, gymnastics, athletics and
	games. We also employ a specialist PE teacher who works with each class
	on a half termly rota. We also take part in tournaments and sporting
	events with local schools.
What happens at	Children have a choice of school dinners or a packed lunch from home.
lunchtime?	There is always a choice of a meat dish (red), vegetarian (green) or jacket
	potato with a topping (blue). Dinners are ordered by the children as part of registration. If your child has a food allergy and requires a tailored
	menu, you would need to complete a special diet request form.

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	However, we also provide a healthy snack of either fruit or vegetables. Children are encouraged to drink water from their water bottles throughout the day.
	Children are also offered milk during the day. This is free until your child turns 5, but after this you may choose to continue paying for milk for your
	child.
Do you have a school library?	Yes! Our library is a very special place in school which the children love to visit weekly. We invest regularly in new reading books to ensure that the books are vibrant and engaging for the children. Our aim is for children to develop a love of reading.
	We know that children who are heard to read regularly make the most progress in all areas of the curriculum, not just English. It is our expectation that children should be heard at least five times a week. We reward home reading with special certificates and badges presented in assembly in front of the whole school. Children love this special time.
Curriculum	We offer a curriculum that is broad, balanced, creative, relevant and meets the needs of all children. Whilst focussing on high standards in English and mathematics, our curriculum has been designed to reflect the needs of our children – to be fun, interesting, creative and thought provoking – thus combining excellence with enjoyment. The curriculum is all the planned activities that we organise in order to promote learning and personal growth and development. It includes not only the formal requirements of the National Curriculum, but also the range of extra-curricular activities that the school organises in order to enrich the experience of the children for example after school sports clubs and activities and residential visits. It also includes the 'hidden curriculum' or what the children learn from the way they are treated and are expected to behave. Being rights respecting schools we teach children to respect others whatever their race or beliefs and teach them to be responsible people who can work and cooperate with others. Our aim is to engage all children through a challenging and stimulating curriculum, so that they are excited to learn and thus develop a lifelong love of learning. Parents are provided with further information about the curriculum that their child is following through parent meetings, the newsletter and the school blog
Which pre-schools do you take children from?	Children at Fryern join us from several different pre-schools and nurseries. Before the children start with us we aim to visit all pre-schools settings to see the children as well as speaking with their key worker. We ensure that our transition pathway helps all children build new relationships with both their peers and staff. We offer a friendship club that starts in the Summer term prior to the children joining us in September. This is an informal time for parents and children to start getting to know each other and school staff. We also offer a range of other transition opportunities.
My child loves to sing, what music opportunities do you offer?	The children in Year 2 and Year 4 are taught by specialist music teachers from Hampshire Music Service. They learn a different instrument each term, including ukuleles, African drums and recorders and perform their new skills to parents in a termly assembly. We also offer peripatetic music lessons and children have the chance to perform at the church services throughout the year.



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	Parents can also choose for their child to take part in the primary Rock Steady programme. This is a fantastic opportunity where the children learn to play an instrument and can choose from the electric guitar, keyboard, drums or vocal and as a rock group take part in half termly concerts. We have weekly singing assemblies and the children are taught a range of songs. We perform these at our Harvest, Christmas and Easter celebrations at the local church.
What transition	Our entry pathway offers several opportunities for you and your child to
opportunities do you offer?	start making relationships with school staff, other children and their families. The YR team spend time getting to know your child as an individual, finding out their interests, areas that they are confident in and those they may need more support with. This information is then used to prepare for the first few weeks in school, helping the children to settle quickly, start to make friends and feel safe and happy. As part of our transition programme we offer home visits, visit the children at nursery/pre-school and have conversations with their keyworker. We also transfer tapestry records. In the summer term, we also offer a 'Friendship Club' where you and your child are invited into school on a Friday afternoon to meet school staff and other families. This is an informal time which builds the children's confidence with coming into to school.
